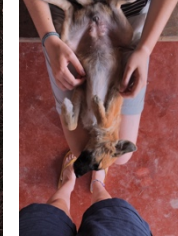
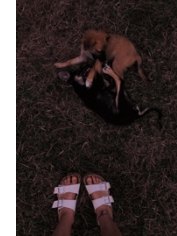

ENGLISH PROJECT

If you remember in last months copy, I wrote about the English projects we were preparing for! ... Well in the first week of February, Erin and I ran our first session! At the first session about 15 kids came – we led a session about introducing yourself and making easy conversation. It was nice to use a bit more English than we normally would with a group of kids. The following week 36 KIDS came, which is obviously a good sign. It was a little stressful at first but we soon adapted and we had lots of fun, this too really boosted my confidence. We run two sessions a week in the afternoons, on a Tuesday and Thursday. We don't have a set criteria to teach them but we are covering the basics - like numbers, colours, family, introducing who you are, places, body parts, hobbies, and daily routine. We make sure they understand each concept we are teaching them by using crafts, worksheets and lots of games. My experience of kids work as a brownie leader and other bits and pieces has come in handy. I really am enjoying running the classes with Erin, seeing the progress in the kids and seeing them have so much fun with what we have prepared is so rewarding.

Alongside our classes, Amy (another missionary based in Nauta) and Laura (our supervisor) have been busy teaching adults English at the Technical College. I have been on photocopying duty and just helping them both prepare for their lessons. As an Action Team we go along and help the students, having them interact with us is helpful as having them hear other types of accents and the language will give them a broader spectrum of English. This too has been good fun, we feel really productive and being an aid to others has been really rewarding.

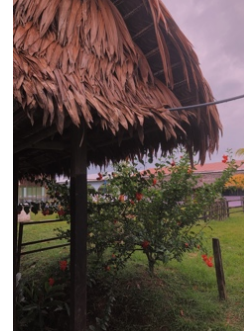

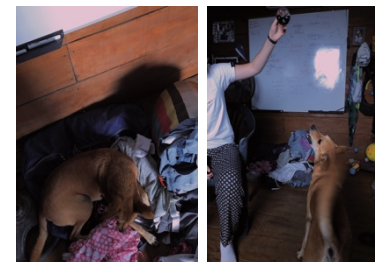


I have found great fellowship too in the other missionaries in Nauta. If you may be aware we live with Laura and Chris. Chris is a retired lady from the states who comes to Peru every six months to be a help to the community around her, she tells us it was her life's dream/goal to come out to Peru to help others and share God's mission here. Her presence in Peru is such an inspiration to me, she has been coming out to Peru since about 2008 and comes out for six months at a time to avoid the cold winters in Ohio where she lives. 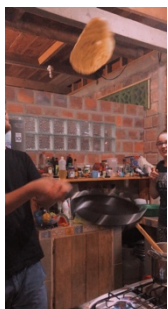

This first week will include visiting the Churches Dave and Michele work with and which we too worked with during November and December saying goodbye and leading services. Dave and Michele have given us the last week in Iquitos as a holiday week, so we have lots of exciting plans of visiting a monkey sanctuary and popping out to our favourite cafes before we fly home on the 29th of March.

God really has provided me with the things I need out here, I am learning to be more patient with myself and others around me. Understanding that God will never let me down is something I have really seen this month and something I am thankful for.

To think I will be writing next months copy on a 12 hour flight home, is crazy!
